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FOR FIRST-TIME PARTICIPANTS

For first-time participants, we offer a special course called *Taking a Closer Look at Workshop Teaching*. Participants will choose a reading strand or a writing strand, and study for half of the day in a large grade level cluster (K-2 or 3-8), and spend the other half of the day in grade level-specific breakout groups with some of the best teachers, literacy coaches, and school leaders in New Jersey.

<u>SESSION 1, 9:30-11:15</u>

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Section A: The Shape of Writing–Using Structure to Build Meaning **Facilitator: Kim Clancey Intended Audience: Grades K-5**

Stories and other types of writing can take lots of twists and turns, and when students learn to think about that, it can make an impact on how they interact with texts they read and enhance meaning with the stories they write. Join Bergen County's 2021 Teacher of the Year Kim Clancey



in a study of various children's books to discover predictable patterns in texts. Participants will disassemble stories and informational texts and make models to represent the structures of these texts. Kim will help you create your own story shape books that can then be made with your own students in upcoming years in narrative, informational, and opinion structures, while also studying child-friendly ways to teach this sophisticated and powerful concept.



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<u>Section B: Teaching Students Foundational Skills in the Balanced Literacy Classroom</u> Facilitator: Enid Martinez

Intended Audience: Grades K-3

Reading and writing are about making meaning from the print we read and the print we create. Behind the rich thinking that comes in well-crafted reading and writing workshops and beautiful books are the complex, foundational language skills that we must teach so that students can make the most of the ideas they discover and the ideas they present. This work is housed across our day in components of Balanced Literacy like shared reading, guided reading, interactive writing, and word study, but also in other structures that are embedded in the elementary classroom. Join primary reading expert Enid Martinez as she teaches you hands-on methods for ensuring that these critical skills are embedded in a meaningful and intentional way to help empower your students to use these skills without giving up the enriching experience of the Balanced Literacy classroom. It is an art. It is a science. It is being a teacher.

<u>Section C: Finding the Thread–Bringing Independent Reading and Classroom Texts into</u> <u>Harmony</u>

Facilitator: Matt Morone

Intended Audience: Grades 6-12

We frequently find ourselves at a textual crossroads: one path leads to unbridled choice in reading, liberating students from the rigidity of required texts but presenting new, and daunting challenges along the way; the other path shepherds them toward powerful classwide texts, where students can learn and love literature together, but at the expense of their individual agency. But what if we arrived at these two divided roads...and took both?! Join Pascack Valley English teacher Matt Morone in this interactive session, to explore best practices for integrating both focused classwide text study with independent, student-selected reading, giving space and respect to both practices, and identifying the threads that unite both experiences. As the great New Jersey poet Yogi Berra once said, "When you come to a fork in the road, take it!"


<u>Section D: Use Your Words–Teaching the Nuts and Bolts of Vocabulary in</u> <u>Balanced Literacy</u> Facilitator: Lorraine Madden

Intended Audience: 3-5

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The upper elementary grades are the time when students are able to create deep meaning in the books they read and the texts they write. The richness of

language found in the foundational skills that deal with vocabulary using roots, prefixes, and suffixes can enrich this learning more and more! Join former special education teacher and head literacy coach Lorraine Madden for a trail guide on how to both scientifically and artfully teach those foundational skills without sacrificing the rich instruction that opens minds and new worlds for students.







<u>Section E: Teach the Reader, the Whole Reader</u> Facilitator: Hannah Schneewind Intended Audience: Grades K-4

In this mad-paced world of covering standards and making sure that we've touched upon all the skills that are needed for students to succeed, it's so easy to forget the children in our care. We have to remember that we're teaching students, not reading. Our instruction, our feedback, and the structures we use need to fit the particular students in our classrooms, students who are forming reading identities that will nurture their lifelong love of books. Hannah Schneewind, teacher and author, will help you recalibrate your teaching so that it's tailored to your students (which is probably why you're a teacher in the first place!)

Section F: Ready, Set, Write–Building the Primary Teacher's Writing Toolbox

Did you ever pack a day trip for your very young child? There are so many things to remember, because each has its own purpose! The same is true when we get our youngest students ready to write. There are mentor texts to inspire, charts to remind, components of Balanced Literacy to

empower, play to prepare and engage, and our own pieces to model. Join Paramus kindergarten teacher and former staff developer Christina Rizzo as she helps you pack your bag with all the right tools to make writing an adventure for your youngest students. She will help you imagine how these tools will help you whether you're writing narrative, opinion, or informational pieces, and how you'll build community all along the way!





Section G: Identity, Hurt & Healing, Heartwork–Three Lenses to Deepen Understanding of Texts and People

Decades ago, in her powerful essay "Mirrors, Windows, And Sliding Glass Doors," Rudine Sims Bishop shared the importance of curating libraries that allow every child to see themselves in the pages of books. Yet over thirty years later, we recognize that our collections still lack representation and that simply placing diverse books on our shelves isn't enough. In this session, Dana Clark, Keisha Smith-Carrington, and Jigisha Vyas will help you explore how to use beautiful, diverse texts as a vehicle to bring reading comprehension, SEL, and social justice together. Join us in studying how to coach readers and invite conversation through the lenses of identity, harm & healing, and heartwork.

Section H: Engage, Empower, Energize, Synergize!! **Facilitators: Jarred Amato and Oona Abrams**

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Intended Audience: Grades 7-12

As middle and high school literacy educators, we want to do ALL the things: independent reading, book clubs, novel study, mentor texts, writer's workshop, and so much more. How can we do justice to each, do each well, and still manage to meet the demands of our pacing guides and curriculum? In an educational landscape of catch-up culture demanding breadth, we can design authentic literacy learning experiences with more depth and still meet multiple standards. Join Jarred Amato and Oona Marie Abrams as they share how they plan to design their literacy block in 2022 (and beyond). In this collaborative workshop, we will share strategies, structures, and resources in order to empower and engage all students as readers and writers.





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<u>Section I: Integrating Phonics into the Balanced Literacy Classroom</u> Facilitator: Lorraine Madden Intended Audience: K-2

In a truly Balanced Literacy environment, students experience a rich learning life of meaning making in both reading and writing. In order to really create a sense of *balance*, we must also address foundational skills of language, which are one of the major building blocks of literacy instruction. In primary grades, this means meaningful study of phonics, phonemic
